HONOLULU CHRISTMAS COUNT - 1988

Under partly cloudy to overcast skies and with winds in the mountains sometimes gusting over 30 mph, the 45th annual Honolulu Christmas Bird Count taken 18 December 1988, produced a combined total of just over 29,900 birds, some 900 more than last year's total, which had been the highest in the history of the Count. Participation and coverage were down slightly from last year, with 64 observers in 31 parties spending 136 party-hours afield and four additional people counting birds in their yards.

Nearly half of the coverage was in parks and residential areas (48%), about one-third in lowland woods and scrub (32%) and only 11% in mountain forests. This is the lowest percentage of count time recorded for mountain forests in at least the past two decades.

The total tally of 29,909 individuals included birds of 48 different species, two fewer species than were found last year. As usual, Zebra Doves were found in greatest numbers. Their total of 8739 was more than 10% higher than the record number found two years ago. All parties on the Honolulu side of the Koolau mountains found many more Zebra Doves than last year, while windward side parties found about the same numbers or fewer.

Common Mynas were next in abundance, with 5147.

Other species with counts exceeding 1000 were, in order, Spotted Dove (2284), Red-vented Bulbul (2256), Lesser Golden Plover (2046), Java Sparrow (1641), House Sparrow (1426) and Japanese White-eye (1024). Java Sparrows jumped from 11th to 6th place with a total more than double the record high counts of the past two years, confirming the continuing rapid increase on O'ahu of this colorful but pesky species. House Sparrows dropped another two notches to 7th place this year.

Among the native Hawaiian forest birds the count of seven 'Elepaio was very low, only the third time in 35 years that the total has fallen below 10. In contrast, the 'Apapane total of 173 was more than double last year's count, and has been exceeded only once in the past 30 years. The 'Amakihi count (108) was within the normally-expected range.

Numbers of Yellow-fronted Canaries, Common Waxbills, and Red Avadavats (known also as Strawberry Finch) are small relative to other species, but nevertheless were much larger this year than in previous counts. These are popular cagebird species that have become established in the wild in recent decades. The Yellow-fronted Canary continues its slow but steady increase in southeastern O'ahu. The other two have increased dramatically in northern and central O'ahu, and are now pushing down into southeastern O'ahu.

Last year's most unusual species, a Brant, was surprisingly

found again this year at the same location on Kaneohe Marine Corps Air Station. It was outdone this year, however, by an extraordinarily unusual bird, a Great-crested Tern (Sterna bergii), found at the same locality. This large tern is resident on tropical islands from Christmas and Palmyra westward through Malaysia and Australia to the Indian Ocean and the east coast of Africa. It has never before been recorded in Hawaii, or anywhere east of here. It was first found at the Air Station in October and has been seen there through November and December by numerous observers including several quite familiar with the species in its native range. A full account of this occurrence will be submitted later to the 'Elepaio.

A number of feral birds were recorded on Count day but these are not included in the Count totals. Counters found 43 Muscovy and other domestic ducks, 4 domestic geese, 3 domestic chickens and one Red-billed Hornbill in Kapiolani Park which more than likely had recently been behind bars in nearby Honolulu Zoo.
